It has been 54 days since the August 21st attack on eleven sites of Syrian rebel strongholds in Damascus that killed over 1,400 people, including over 400 children (UN report), and the violence does not appear to be abating. On September 10th, President Obama delivered remarks on the situation in Syria, clearly supporting the strategy of a limited strike on Syria's chemical weapons launch sites in order to degrade their abilities to launch attacks and dissuade them and others to use chemical weapons while recognizing the possibility of an international deal. He believes that if the U.S and others do not respond, the situation will worsen and President Bashar Al-Assad's stockpiles will proliferate to terrorist groups and other harsh regimes.


The situation, however, is not nearly unprecedented, as Secretary of State John Kerry and President Obama sometimes conveyed to an international audience. Most recently, in 1988 Iraqi dictator Saddam Hussein dropped mustard gas and nerve agents on the Kurdish city of Halabja, apparently avenging the fall of the city from Iraq. The attack killed thousands of people, 75% of whom were women or children (BBC). Most disturbingly, the attack came at a time of war between Iran and Iraq, and declassified CIA reports suggest that the U.S, which was ostensibly allied with Hussein at the time, ignored the attacks (Al-Jazeera).

Iraq's chemical weapons stockpile was hardly a secret, and the Reagan administration knew full well that Iraq maintained and sometimes used chemical weapons. However, Washington thought the danger of Iran superseded the danger of any possible Iraqi chemical attack. Iraq even made a statement in 1984 nearly acknowledging their stockpiles and their intent to use those stockpiles. Iraq stated that the Iranian invaders "should know that for every harmful insect, there is an insecticide capable of annihilating it . . . and Iraq possesses this annihilation insecticide." The relationship with Iraq at the time was too important to risk losing it over the attacks (Washington Post). Incidentally, or perhaps not, Secretary of Defense Donald Rumsfeld and the Bush administration cited Iraq's use of chemical weapons as justification for the invasion 2003 invasion of Iraq.

The Obama administration is hoping to make the argument that this attack is different. President Obama staunchly opposes the idea of another war, but he also believes that a failure to do anything could exacerbate the violence in the region. The Syrian Civil War has claimed over 115,000 lives; many of the lives have been lost in barbaric manners, such as using children as human shields or bombing civilians or using chemical weapons. President Obama needs to

> establish credibility considering his comment that the use of Syrian chemical weapons against civilians would be a "red line," but at what cost?

The international community has a checkered record on the issue of military strikes and intervention, and one of America's most important allies, Great Britain, already declared it will not attack Syria in any capacity (CNN). But if the U.S attacks yet another Middle Eastern country, terrorist groups may respond by using the attack as more propaganda that America's foreign policy is thinly veiled imperialism and that the U.S

itself is a nation of thugs and murderers. There is no better weapon of recruitment to give terrorist groups than more military strikes.

Additionally, Al-Nusra, an Al-Qaeda linked group, is one of the Syrian rebelsâ€[™] best group of fighters (Washington Times). In a strike, we will directly help them and possibly aid in the establishment of another Islamic, extremist regime if Al Qaeda fills the power vacuum left by Assad. The Obama administration believes, though, that the Free Syrian Army is not a terrorist group and that the new government could be more friendly towards the U.S and Israel, which is one of the gambles of an attack.

On Thursday, September 26, the U.S and Russia reached a deal on Syria agreeing that if Syria handed over its chemical weapons stockpiles to the international community, an attack would be avoided, but failure to comply would lead to immediate international repercussions (Christian Science Monitor). The deal would avoid U.S intervention and would be legal under international and U.N laws. Russia is the Syrian regime's top ally, and Syria agreed to the deal immediately. This support from Syria possibly suggests a breakthrough, but the deal gives time to Assad to scatter or hide his chemical weapons if he so desires. The deal places much responsibility in the hands of Assad to destroy his weapons, which is dangerous considering his history.

Russia, arguably is complicit in Assad's use of chemical weapons considering their monetary and military support of him, but the deal is quite hopeful. The international outcry and controversy will dissuade future attacks using chemical weapons. The deal is a peaceful solution which could spark a change in the perception that the U.S is imperialist or puts military ahead of diplomacy. The deal does not directly embolden the Syrian opposition, which eliminates the fear of aiding Al-Qaeda, and the deal prevents more U.S foreign entanglements while implementing safeguards to ensure Assad adheres to the deal.

Considering the vitriolic situation in Syria, the ambivalence of the international community and the nature of the attack itself, the deal demonstrates a condemnation of chemical weapons without adding fuel to the Syrian Civil War's fire. If President Bashar Al-Assad holistically complies with all dictates of the deal, this will be a watershed event in history that illustrates the power of diplomacy and international cohesion.

Rick Yancey's The Monstrumologist A Book Review

I chose this book, The Monstrumologist by Rick Yancey, not because of the intriguing title or cover artwork but because it received the Michael L Printz Honor Award. Two other favorite books of mine, *I Am the Messenger* and *The Book Thief,* both by Markus Zusak and both equally fantastic, also received this award.

The Monstrumologist chronicles the apprenticeship between Will Henry, a young orphaned twelve year old boy, and a mysterious and moody "mostrumologist" called Dr. Pellinore Warthrop. This book features the horrifying Anthropophagus, a hideous headless race of monsters, with rows of razor sharp teeth in their stomachs, who happen to be very fond of human flesh.

Will Henry, Dr. Warthrop and a slew of other characters, including the tortured Malachi Stinnet, wary Constable Robert Morgan, and charismatic and manipulative Dr. John Kearns, must defend the town, New Jerusalem, and the East coast from these deadly creatures. They must do this in secret, not alerting anyone of their existence, except for a select few, so as not to cause panic. In addition the Warthrop family has a history with the Anthropophagi, adding conflict and dimension to the story.

Initially I thought this book would be too childish because it centers on a twelve year old

character. This fear was completely unfounded as *The Monstrumologist* is one of the most gory, morbid, horrific, gruesome, graphic books I've ever had the pleasure of reading. The descriptions of the monsters' appearances and bloody carnages feature some of the most graphically interesting imagery I've ever experienced.

I personally feel imagery can easily be overdone and, although it may have been overdone at times during this book, it was ultimately very successful. The raw descriptions, articulate and advanced writing style, dimensional characters, absolutely gory and grisly nature, and melancholy undertones earn this book a solid four out of five stars.

When picking this book up I was unaware it was part of a series, but will most definitely be continuing with the following companion novels. I recommend it to anyone, but would caution a prospective reader of the extreme gore.

The Monstrumologist by Rich Yancey is about a twelve year old named Will Henry apprenticed to a monster scientist after the tragic death of his parents in the late 1800s. His new guardian Pellinmore Warthrop involves him in late-night investigations and experiments where they dissect monsters and investigate strange appearances around their New England town.

The novel starts out with a grave robber delivering the corpse of a monster he discovered while excavating a grave in the middle of the night. This leads Pellinmore and Will to believe that more of the man-eating monsters lurk in the shadows, eventually prompting an effort to hunt down the remaining beasts. As the story accelerates the graphic and detailed imagery, the constant threat of danger and the sense of mystery intensify the plot.

The author includes detailed imagery into every element of the story, often personifying inanimate objects in their description to assign them a new meaning or provide a different perspective to look at them. Also, the author graphically describes encounters with the maneating monsters, including details about the demise of the victims and how their bodies are destroyed by the ravenous beasts.

Intense imagery of the five senses is also included in flashbacks, providing a crisp picture of what the characters experienced. An impending feeling of danger was inserted to the plot with the constant threat of attack by the monsters, causing a perpetual accumulation of suspense. Also, how the population of monsters came to America from their native Africa is unclear throughout the book, causing a mystery that lasts throughout the novel.

The imagery intensifies the suspense and mystery of the plot that build up to a climax that ultimately defines the main character. Overall, this book earns four out of five stars.

Features Diana Nyad's Inspirational Feat

Perseverance, hard work, and dedication, are all things we hear over and over again. Who better to exemplify these traits than Diana Nyad, the endurance swimmer who recently completed the first unassisted swim from Cuba to Key West?

As we all enjoyed our last day of summer September 2nd, Diana finished her grueling 110 mile swim, battling lethal Box jellyfish, five foot ocean swells and extreme discomfort from her specialized swimming mask. She also had to worry about shark attacks. The swim took a total of 53 hours of which she was not allowed to hold onto the boat for rest. She was fed mostly a high calorie liquid diet by her boat crew. This wasn't Diana's first attempt at swimming from Cuba to Florida. In 1978, when she was 28, she made her first attempt but failed. She then tried 3 more times unsuccessfulfully because of east flowing currents, lightning, and lethal Box jellyfish stings which some say are more dangerous than sharks attacks.

Finally ,on the fifth try with the aid of a swift southern current, she completed her lifelong goal at the age of 64. As she staggered out of the water on Smathers Beach in Key West, saying only, "Never give up, you are never too old to follow your dreams, and this looks like a solitary sport but it is really a team effort".
