

**“Moment of Remembrance”

**Announcement from Mr. Swanson at 8:46 AM**

Good morning, Hingham High School. Please excuse the interruption. Across the country at this moment, 8:46 AM, Eastern Time, Americans are pausing to remember the events of September 11, 2001, eighteen years ago, today.

“The terrorist attacks of September 11, 2001, were unprecedented in our nation’s history. Yet, on a day of unimaginable loss, America was uplifted and united by acts of heroism and bravery. Police, fire, EMTs, military -- as well as citizens of every age, profession and background -- answered the call to serve. Their example proved that hope, courage, and patriotism could heal and strengthen a nation. In 2009, our federal government established September Eleventh as a National Day of Service and Remembrance. Annually, millions of Americans unite to honor the 2,996 lives lost on September 11th through solemn remembrance, patriotic ceremony, and uplifting community service. [Today is] a day to honor and remember those we lost, pay tribute to those who courageously answer the call to service in the military and as first responders, and renew the spirit of patriotism and compassion that united our nation in the challenging months that followed September 11th.”<sup>1</sup> So, at this time, let all of us here at Hingham High School pause for a moment of silent remembrance...

Today, on *this* September Eleventh, may all of us re-commit to our highest American ideals of community, compassion, justice, freedom, and concern for others. As we do so, let us remember that those same ideals should find constant expression right here in the halls of our
